Interim Perspective by Pastor Joel

I am really excited to celebrate Reformation 500. I think celebrating is something we need to do especially as a community. So I'm so glad that you are willing and wanting to join in this celebration. The Reformation stands as a significant time and event in history, which means it has a major impact on life today and where we are going in the future.

The beginnings of the Reformation divided the Church; there came to be Protestants as well as Catholics, and among Protestants there were a variety of denominations – not just Lutheran. Luther, of course, originally tried to "correct" some teaching and practices within the Church. His vision was not to fragment the Church but to strengthen it by emphasizing what was most essential and true to the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Now, after 500 years since the start of the Reformation, we can rejoice in that a vast amount of Lutheran Church bodies (Lutheran World Federation) and the Catholic Church have come to agreement on a number of ideas that had previously divided us. It seems that the Reformation vision of Martin Luther is coming to be. It's not that the Catholics have finally agreed with Lutherans or vice versa, as much as we have discussed the issues and ideas and have all come to greater realization of what is good and true. We have gained by listening and sharing with each other.

Some differences remain but they are not divisive. We recognize that we are brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus. We accept that there is a variety of piety but that Jesus is Lord of the Church that includes and extends over us both and others as well. So we will celebrate with our sisters and brothers in the Catholic Church on Sunday, October 22, 6:30 pm at St. Matthew's. Together we will pray and sing, give thanks and repent, read scripture and celebrate what unites us. In that worship service we will acknowledge the "Five Ecumenical Imperatives for Lutherans and Catholics" that we hold as the truth of our reality and future. I've reprinted them here for everyone to consider and reflect on.

- The Catholics and Lutherans should always begin from the perspective of unity and not from the point of view of division in order to strengthen what is held in common even though the differences are more easily seen and experienced.
- The Catholics and Lutherans should again commit themselves to seek visible unity, to elaborate together what this means in concrete steps, and to strive repeatedly toward this goal.
- Lutherans and Catholics should jointly rediscover the power of the gospel of Jesus Christ for our time.
- The Catholics and Lutherans should witness together to the mercy of God in proclamation and service to the world.

Words from the Bishop - Why the Reformation Matters

We are closing in on the 500th anniversary of the monk Martin Luther nailing (or maybe not nailing) the 95 Theses on the Wittenberg Church door, a symbolic act that is the starting point for the Reformation. This anniversary has gotten a lot of attention from quarters that normally do not pay a lot of attention to religion, and some that do. Germany is concluding a 10 year count-down to the 31st of October, 2017. The Lutheran World Federation began the year with an ecumenical service including Pope Francis, and continued the observation at the Assembly in Namibia. National magazines and newspapers have done features on the Reformation, and numerous documentaries, articles and reflections have been done on Martin Luther.

Martin Luther was, indeed, a fascinating character. Countless biographies have been written about him—as hero, as villain, from a psychological perspective, from a spiritual perspective. It is fascinating to visit the Luther Museum in Wittenberg and see a history of how Reformation anniversaries were noted over the years, and how Luther was portrayed over the years.

But interesting as all of that is, Martin Luther himself is not the reason the Reformation matters. The Reformation matters because it changed history. It changed the geopolitical contours of Europe. And it changed the religious landscape of Europe, and eventually the rest of the world. Christianity's split into the Eastern (Orthodox) Church and the Western (Roman Catholic) Church was of similar significance centuries before. The Reformation's split of the Western Church into Protestant and Catholic, coming as it did when the medieval western world was meeting modernity, helped shape modernity.

The Reformation matters to us as Christians because it was a reform movement within the church, taking seriously matters of salvation. The Reformation matters because it challenged the church to rethink its practices and priorities, because it would not settle for easy answers, because it gave people the opportunity to look at their faith with fresh eyes and new understanding. The Reformation matters because it still challenges our institutions and our priorities, and it still will not settle for easy answers.

Regardless of what Martin Luther intended with his 95 Theses, the Reformation exploded into something much more than an academic discussion of theological points. Accusations were hurled. Riots erupted. Wars broke out. Mutual condemnations poisoned the air. It was not a movement without bloodshed, without cost.

Now, 500 years later, we are finding ways to talk about the Reformation as Protestant and Catholic Christians. In Montana, we will do this during our Convocation in Lewistown on October 27 and at our joint service at the Helena Cathedral on October 30 at 7 pm.

Different people find different aspects of the Reformation most meaningful, and commemorate the anniversary in different ways. As I read your church newsletters I am learning about the education classes, the sermons and the joint community worship services that you are planning. And for those of you who have not yet started planning, you don't need to worry about an October 31 deadline. We plan to keep living out the Reformation after that, as well! We have resources on our website that you can use.

In the next few weeks I will be sharing my reflections on some of the highlights of the Reformation. Because the Reformation does matter.

In January 2015, the members of PELLA church were challenged and encouraged to support the final journey of paying off the balance of the loan for our beautifully remodeled church facility. At the beginning of the campaign, our loan balance was \$1,504,184.00. In September of 2016, the Pella "Prize Patrol" presented its first announcement of giving to date. At that presentation,

the congregation was informed that \$454,674.18 had been contributed. That was an exciting first announcement! Fast forward now to September 2017...On Sunday, September 17, 2017, the prize patrol was back for an announcement! At this time, the total paid off on our loan is now \$842,458.98. This leaves a total of \$661,725.02. Our "Set Free to Serve" committee is hopeful and excited that in September of 2018, we could possibly announce our goal has been met?! We believe with the grace of God and the generosity of our congregation, that this goal can be achieved. Without the burden of paying off this loan, we can only imagine the freedom to support many other worthy ministries in our church, community, and world! We will truly be SET FREE TO SERVE!

Summary of Pella Council: September

The checking account has a balance of \$98,263.32 and the general fund is \$12,417.27. The "Set Free to Serve" loan balance is \$668,459.09.

Reformation 500 Task Force has scheduled a meal and movie on Wednesday, October 18. A Lutheran-Catholic prayer service will be held at St. Matthew's at 6:30 pm on October 22, and Pella will have a Reformation Sunday worship on October 29. Plans are to have dialog sermons during Sunday worship from September 17 - October 22.

Worship and Music reviewed piano tuning/tuners and a schedule for having this done. Honorariums and budget planning was also discussed.

Christian Education has filled all teacher/guide positions for the upcoming WBS/Confirmation year. LYO students are making plans to attend the ELCA Youth Gathering event in Houston next summer. Senior Recognition Sunday is scheduled for April 29.

The Synod review team has also approved the changes to our Constitution. Both the Constitution and Bylaws are ready for presentation and approval by the Congregation at the Annual meeting (January 2018).
